The fish tank would allow me to take underwater photos at the event without spending thousands of dollars on a waterproof housing for the camera.


Then on the Saturday before Easter, the day of the event, an assignment covering a firefighter training exercise in Lebanon, all morning meant I missed the underwater egg hunt.
